## ADMINISTRATIVE, TEACHING, LEADERSHIP EXPERIENCE

Conversation Center Director, University of Iowa (UI), 2016-present

- **As Director**: Responsible for all aspects of the UI Conversation Center, a service-learning unit housed in the Rhetoric Department. Responsibilities include:
  - o **Staffing**: recruit, train, retain conversation partners, and develop peer leaders
  - Scheduling: plan, implement, and monitor the Center's appointment schedule, including
    multiple satellite locations and multiple types of partner (volunteer, Practicum student, Peer
    Leader) each with their own schedule and appointment needs
  - Space planning: negotiate with campus & community partners to secure space, with UI locations including the Main Library (our primary location), Pomerantz Business Library, Hardin Health Sciences Library, Lichtenberg Engineering Library, Hardin Health Sciences Library, Frank Business Communication Center, the Baker Teacher-Leader Center, the Stanley Museum of Art, and community locations including MERGE (the public co-working and community space of the Iowa City Area Development Group, ICAD) and Iowa City Public Library
  - Collecting Statistics: Since 2016 the Center trained ~150 students in intercultural communication through hosting ~700 predominantly international conversation seekers in nearly 6,000 individual conversations
  - Program Development and Management: review and monitor all Center programs for viability, efficacy, and potential expansion and efficiencies
  - Marketing: strategy development and implementation, overseeing individual designs and production, including financial decisions, leveraging campus relationships, and seeking partners in design (e.g., the UI Libraries)
  - Scholarship: build assessment and other tools to gain insight into our student support work.
     Present at conferences, workshops, and other spaces to help others looking to support students facing social barriers to campus access with a two-pronged focus: service-learning and international education
  - Assessment & Quality Assurance: maintaining positive brand image and lines of communication to physically disparate staff and satellite locations
  - Curriculum Integration: aligning Center needs with curricular needs of student staff and interested campus partners (e.g., securing Honors Experiential Learning credit for Honors students who enroll in the RHET:2090 course that trains our staff)
  - Strategic Planning: developing plans and relationships to make long-term goals a reality, setting up this new enterprise to be flexible in the face of changing futures, including demographic shifts, enrollment changes, and differences in institutional administrative focus
  - Center Culture: Develop and maintain positive culture where staff hold each other mutually accountable and use their work (whether as student or myself as director) as a professional development opportunity
- RHET:2090 Conversation Practicum: Our 3-credit service-learning course for Center staff. Each semester I co-teach this course with the Center's Assistant Director Sonja Mayrhofer. Students spend 3 weeks learning intercultural communication skills including visits from campus experts from: English as a Second Language, the First-Gen Task Force, and International Student and Scholar Services. Students also meet their Peer Leaders (see below), veteran conversation partners who return to lead small teams of new partners building their own intercultural skills. Class then breaks for the middle 10

weeks, during which each student is responsible for 3 hours weekly of either one-on-one conversation appointments or embedding in ESL classrooms (a program collaboratively developed in the past year). Conversation seekers (those clients who book appointments) are predominantly international students and scholars, including graduate students aspiring to teach and scholars looking to connect to the local community (educational, social, etc.). During the 10 weeks of conversation, students have a chance to unpack their experience through completing weekly online reflections, weekly discussion with their classmates, and bi-weekly meetings with their small team led by a Peer Leader. Students meet one-on-one with me in the latter half of conversations to begin developing final reflective presentations delivered during the final two weeks of class. Presentations serve as a basis for how they will carry their experience forward meaningfully into their lives, educations, and careers.

- Peer Leader Program: Developed this peer-based team leader program from scratch in 2018. Inspired by time in non-profit (summers working for the Berwick Boys Foundation out of West Bridgewater, MA), this program gives returning RHET:2090 Conversation Practicum graduates responsibility for a small team of new students. To help their mentorship, these Peer Leaders draw on additional roles in administrative and marketing support for the Conversation Center, forming the student leadership team that tackles challenges in staffing, implementation, extra events, and more.
- **Digital Design and Social Media Internship**: Developed this internship in 2017 for a student building their digital design and social media profile in support of the Conversation Center's mission. Students are able to hone their skills and profile and collaboratively develop a social media strategy. This position was also designed to function as the internship integrated into certain majors (e.g., Communication Studies).
- ESL Embedding Program: Developed in 2019 in partnership with the ESL Department. We placed
  undergraduate partners from the Conversation Practicum directly into ESL classrooms. Spring 2019
  pilot was a single visit, expanded to 4 weekly visits during Summer 2019, and we plan to continue
  embedding in the future to support Iowa ESL students and make it that much easier for them to book
  appointments in the Conversation Center.
- RHET:1115 Academic Success Resources: Rhetoric's Conversation Center: Co-developed this
  course with Assistant Director Sonja Mayrhofer in collaboration with UI Distance Learning staff after a
  successful grant proposal for online course development through CLAS in Fall 2018. This course
  offers those seeking Conversation Center appointments on a regular basis the opportunity to receive
  course credit through online work paired with regular appointments in the Conversation Center.
- Assistant Director Position: Created this position in 2018. The Assistant Director co-teaches our staffing class, recruits staff and clients, represents the program to administration and the public, and is involved in all levels of mission visioning and program development.
- **Grad Coordinator Position:** Created this position in 2017. The Grad Coordinator, under supervision, organizes and populates our schedule, is responsible for weekly schedule maintenance and individual student check-ins re: hours, excused absences, and client reports.

- CC Summer Program: Managed our Summer Program. During each summer since 2016 we've run a
  paid version of our conversation program, first through a generous donation, then through support
  from the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. Each summer I recruit, hire, and manage student
  employees for our summer conversation program, completing scheduling and marketing, and
  monitoring usage and budgets to ensure efficiencies.
- Community Conversation: A service to community aimed at supporting linguistic and cultural inclusion, especially among adult immigrant and refugee populations. I developed partnerships with local non-profits to host this drop-in conversation hour aimed at supporting community members beyond the University. Hosted at MERGE, the downtown space of the Iowa City Area Development group, and in collaboration with Friendship Community Project, a local non-profit ESL organization, we staffed this weekly conversation for all interested since 2017, drawing the attention of local media in 2018 including KGAN TV, Little Village, and Iowa Now.
- **Logo-designer**: designed the Conversation Center Logo in 2016, including horizontal and vertical formats.





- Tagline developer: developed Conversation Center tagline in 2019:
   Building an Inclusive Iowa One Conversation at a Time
- GoldRush Fundraising Campaign: Developed and oversaw this successful fundraising campaign in 2018. To support our ongoing efforts to build intercultural communication skills, we needed funds for space, events, and to support students building leadership skills (e.g., through presenting at conferences). GoldRush is a crowdsourced fundraising platform supported by the UI where organizations develop and implement their own campaign. The Peer Leaders and I collaborated to plan and execute a strategy including producing a video explaining our work, and an email and social media marketing outreach that was so successful we ran past our initial goal and even met our push goal (including the largest single donation to any GoldRush campaign).
- Stanley Sketch and Chat: Developed this event in collaboration with the Stanley Museum of Art in 2019. Each semester we host a conversation hour with sketchbooks in the Museum, helping students talk about and engage the art and helping the space feel more accessible.
- High School ELL Pilot: New in 2020, we've partnered with Iowa City Community School District to
  provide conversational English support to ELL students in local high schools. Required meeting with

upper district administration and with the individual ELL instructor whose class we support. Putting trained undergraduates in contact with ELL students in high school has the potential to overlap college access with linguistic and cultural acquisition.

## Rhetoric Faculty, University of Iowa, 2015-present

- Develop and teach UI courses, including gen-ed research, writing, and public speaking

- Public Speaking for Academics: Developed this Graduate-level course in communication skills. We
  recruit an interdisciplinary graduate cohort from across colleges, from across the sciences and
  humanities. Students build their teaching, presenting, job, and networking skills through
  presentations, classmate feedback, and weekly discussions that build interdisciplinary understanding
  and each student's ability to communicate their expertise outside their discipline to other academics,
  to potential job and grant committees, and to students and the community. This is precisely the kind
  of professional development community-building I consider a key part of my professional identity.
- Co-Chair, Rhetoric Colloquium Committee: Modernized this series in 2018 from purely research-based into a professional development series. We sought to support the largely instructional track Rhetoric faculty through connecting with important campus resources like Academic Support and Retention, the UI Libraries, and the UI Counseling Service. Other presentations built community among faculty by asking them, for example, to bring triumphs and challenges into the colloquium space (a community space that was a burgeoning need in our rapidly-growing department).
- Chair, Centers and Resources Committee: The Rhetoric Department is composed of 4 primary Committees corresponding to our key missions: Core (General Education); Minor; Graduate and Professional Development; and Centers and Resources. The latter serves as a collaborative forum for our universal campus resources (including the Writing Center, Speaking Center, Conversation Center, Iowa Digital Engagement and Learning, and the Success in Rhetoric program). As chair, I've implemented a democratic election procedure, and worked to use the Centers' outward facing insights (e.g., active social media presence) to support the entire department. The committee also serves as an incubator for connection to campus and building collaborations for Rhetoric.

- Departmental SWOT Analysis: Made key contributions. Bringing on a new Dean to the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences has meant a new Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats analysis and a corresponding set of Rhetoric Department Goals looking to align our SWOT with collegiate and University goals. My work was specifically named as helpful to the accelerated process of developing measurable and concrete goals for various parts of department, a contribution that turned on the relationships I have developed all across campus over the past 5 years.
- Member, Rhetoric Department Executive Committee: Member of this representative governing body 2018-present. Responsibilities include merit reviews, mission visioning, etc. representative of the nearly 40 Rhetoric Faculty and serving as an advisory committee to the DEO. We work to find innovative solutions to being one of the first and largest instructional track faculty groups in the UI.
- Philosophy in Public: Developed this fully online service-learning Philosophy course in 2016, taught every semester since, recruiting students from a wide variety of majors to pair a volunteer/service/internship of their choice with philosophy and career readings with personal and community reflection. This class looks to help people take experience outside their chosen academic track and use it as an opportunity to better understand their educational journey and how they are transforming through it into the professional they hope to be.
- Honors Primetime Instructor: Invited to develop and teach this intensive pre-semester introduction
  to campus and academics for first-year Honors students each fall since 2017. Aimed at developing
  intercultural communication skills, this intensive class utilizes readings, structured interactions and
  discussion to help students build awareness of how their language both includes and excludes
  people, serving to make campus either more or less inclusive.
- Team Member, Big Ideas Course Development: Joined an interdisciplinary group of scholars developing a Big Ideas course. The Big Ideas designation is for courses co-taught by an interdisciplinary faculty group capturing multiple perspectives for an undergraduate audience. This course centered around Identity and Agency Online. Collaborators include representatives from the UI Library, Law School, Journalism, and Computer Science.
